Christian Unity Week — January 18-25, 2025 To celebrate Christian Unity Week a 'Worship Service' involving several church congregations in Renfrew is being organized by the clergy. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend.

This year's theme is "Do you believe this?" We will reflect on the story of Martha's confession of faith in Jesus.

The Worship Service is on Wednesday, January 22, 2025 at 2:00 pm at Our Lady of Fatima Church.

Epiphany means manifestation. What the Church celebrates today is the manifestation of our Lord to the whole world; after being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. Christian tradition has ever seen in the Magi the first fruits of the Gentiles; they lead in their wake all the peoples of the earth, and thus the Epiphany is an affirmation of universal salvation. St. Leo brings out this point admirably in a sermon, read at Matins, in which he shows in the adoration of the Magi the beginnings of Christian faith, the time when the great mass of the heathen sets off to follow the star which summons it to seek its Saviour.

That is the meaning, too, of the wonderful prophecy from Isaias which the liturgy appoints to be read in the first nocturn at Matins and at the Epistle of the Mass. This same thought of universal redemption the Church returns to as she sings, in the antiphon to the Magnificat at 2nd Vespers, applying the words to herself, of the union with Christ typified by the wedding feast at Cana, by the baptism of her children foreshadowed by that of Christ in the waters of the Jordan. Formerly the Epiphany was an additional day for solemn baptisms.

JUBILEE YEAR: Pope Francis has declared 2025 as a Holy Year of Jubilee for the Catholic Church. Established in 1470 by Pope Paul II to occur every 25 years, the Jubilee is a sacred time for transformation through God's holiness. It invites Catholics worldwide to renew their relationship with God, one another, and creation, celebrating the central Christian Message of hope.

The Jubilee year began on Dec. 24th with the opening of the Holy Door in Rome. Pope Francis has dedicated this Jubilee to "Pilgrims of Hope." Rooted in baptism, we are nourished by Christ, guided by the Spirit, and called to walk in hope - trusting in God's grace and longing for eternal life.

The Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 offers an opportunity for all to embark on a pilgrimage of hope – whether locally in our diocese cathedral or shrine (like St. Ann's Cormac) or Canada's National Shrines, or by travelling to Rome. Over the coming months you will hear more about the Jubilee Year in our own Diocese.

World Day of Peace 2025: The Holy See published the Holy Father's Message for the 58th World Day of Peace, which will be celebrated on 1 January 2025, the liturgical Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, who is likewise the Queen of Peace. The theme chosen by Pope Francis is "Forgive us our trespasses: grant us your peace".

This theme aligns with the spirit of the Jubilee Year, focusing on hope, forgiveness, and bringing people together. Inspired by Laudato Si' and Fratelli Tutti, the message highlights the need for change to build lasting peace in our lives individually, in communities, and worldwide.

In his message, the Holy Father states: "May 2025 be a year in which peace flourishes! A true and lasting peace that goes beyond quibbling over the details of agreements and human compromises. May we seek the true peace that is granted by God to hearts disarmed: hearts not set on calculating what is mine and what is yours; hearts that turn selfishness into readiness to reach out to others; hearts that see themselves as indebted to God and thus prepared to forgive the debts that oppress others; hearts that replace anxiety about the future with the hope that every individual can be a resource for the building of a better world."



The Baptism of the Lord

In the liturgical calendar, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord signifies the end of the Christmas season. The Baptism of the Lord is notable because it marks the beginning of Jesus' ministry and confirms his identity as the Son of God. This event is documented in all the gospels except John.
